

Dr. Panos Kanavos je izredni profesor za mednarodno zdravstveno politiko na Oddelku za zdravstveno politiko na London School of Economics and Political Science (Fakulteta za ekonomijo in politične vede LSE), kjer je tudi namestnik direktorja in programski vodja Raziskovalne skupine za medicinsko tehnologijo (MTRG).

Doktor Kanavos je bil Harknessov štipendist za politiko zdravstvenega varstva na Oddelku za ambulantno obravnavo in preventivo na Harvardski medicinski šoli, kot profesor pa predava tudi na Univerzi v Baslu, Univerzi v Delawareu in Londonski šoli za higieno in tropsko medicino. Po izobrazbi je ekonomist in poučuje ekonomiko zdravja, farmako-ekonomijo in politiko, financiranje zdravstva, je strokovnjak za pogajanja na zdravstvenem področju in principe ocenjevanja zdravstvene tehnologije.

Dr. Kanavos je svetovalec številnih mednarodnih vladnih in nevladnih organizacij, vključno z Evropsko komisijo, Evropskim parlamentom, Svetovno banko, Svetovno zdravstveno organizacijo, Organizacijo za gospodarsko sodelovanje in razvoj (OECD), Ameriškim združenjem upokojencev in ministrstev za zdravje številnih držav, tako tistih v razvoju, kot tistih v tranziciji in razvitih državah.

Dr Panos Kanavos is Associate Professor in International Health Policy in the Department of Health Policy at London School of Economics and Political Science, Deputy Director at LSE Health and Programme Director of the Medical Technology Research Group (MTRG).

Dr Kanavos has previously been Harkness Fellow in Health Care Policy in the Department of Ambulatory Care and Prevention, Harvard Medical School and has held visiting professor appointments at the University of Basel, the University of Delaware and the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine. He is an economist by training, and teaches health economics, pharmaceutical economics and policy, health care financing, health care negotiations, and principles of health technology assessment.

He has acted as an advisor to a number of international governmental and non-governmental organizations, including the European Commission, the European Parliament, the World Bank, the World Health Organization, the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), the American Association for Retired Persons, and Ministries of Health of over 28 transition, emerging and developing countries.
